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



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

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48-HOUR STOPOVER



If plenty of razzmatazz with a side order of relaxation is what you're looking for in a stopover or exotic city break, then Singapore could be just the ticket. A shopaholic's nirvana, you can barely turn a corner without bumping into another super-mall. Throw in an awe-inspiring skyline, tropical beach, world-class theme park, gloriously green gardens, a sprinkling of temples plus colonial treasures, and you soon have a packed itinerary.

WHAT TO DO

- If you want culture, you can't go past Chinatown, perhaps the most
 multicultural part of the city. This vibrant hotspot is home to more
 shops and cafes than you can shake a stick at, but it's the history and
 culture that really sets it apart. The Buddha's Tooth Relic Temple is a
 definite must-see.
- Head to Maxwell Road Food Centre for lunch. Catch the MRT
 (Singapore's metro) from Chinatown station to Orchard Road –
 Singapore's answer to Oxford Street. More than 20 shopping malls,
 studded with Times Square-style animated billboards, lure you to
 hammer the plastic in designer emporiums and high street fashion
 chain stores.
- Explore Sentosa's varied attractions. Visit Fort Siloso, a World War II
 defence, sign up for the zip wire, brave the iFLY simulated skydive
 or head to Universal Studios Singapore.
- Take a taxi across town to the delightful Singapore Botanic Gardens, home to a forest of delicate blooms in the National Orchid Garden.
 Go local for supper, grabbing yourself a picnic table at Makansutra, Glutton's Bay.

MUST-SEES ①

- Sentosa Island located just half a kilometre off the southern coast is the adventure capital of Singapore. Attractions range from the Butterfly Park and Fort Siloso to Wavehouse, Maritime Experiential Museum and Universal Studios. It's easy to spend your entire trip here. Singapore Flyer, a giant ferris wheel that occupies a commanding location next to the Marina Bay Sands, offers gorgeous views of the city and surrounds. There's also a popular dining precinct on the ground level.
- Gardens by the Bay is a 54-hectare oasis that feels like a real-life version of Avatar's Pandora. From the imposing canopy of steel trees to the giant glass conservatories, it's completely out of this world.
- iFly is for those who want to go skydiving but are afraid of heights.
 Experience the thrill of weightlessness without the danger.



 Take a spare foldable bag along for all your extra shopping! To truly experience a destination, people always say you need at least 48 hours to immerse yourself in the sights, sounds, smells and tastes... and even then you're only just scratching the surface.





London is often a stopover point for many before continuing on to the rest of Western Europe. Whether you have an extended layover or want to make the most of a quick trip, there's always something new to check out.

WHAT TO DO

- There is no shortage of tourist staples: Buckingham Palace, Piccadilly Circus, Marble Arch, Big Ben, the iconic red double-decker bus.

 London is not for the faint-hearted or poor; start off with a proper English breakfast and order a fry-up. After breakfast, make your first stop the world-class British Museum, home to the spoils of Britain's wide-ranging history. Check out the Rosetta Stone, Egyptian mummies and the Elgin Marbles, a collection amassed by Lord Elgin in the 19th century that includes sculptures from the Parthenon in Athens.
- From there head to Covent Garden for a stroll around the cobbled piazza, and then pop in to BB Bakery for tea and a macaroon. In Trafalgar Square there's often something going on, from a food festival to a demonstration. Take in the atmosphere and keep your eyes peeled for the world's smallest police station tucked away in the south-east corner of the square. Nelson's Column guards the square, with four golden lions around its base.
- As evening approaches head east to the newly opened Shard building,
 officially the tallest in Western Europe. At its summit is The View from
 The Shard, and sunset is the best time to visit. Make the trip up to the
 top before darkness descends to take in a view of everything within
 a 40-mile radius, and then watch the sun sink and the city's skyscrapers
 and Canary Wharf light up the night.
- Head out for an early-morning visit to Westminster Abbey, before the crowds arrive. This 700-year-old building is the coronation church (and location of Prince William and Kate Middleton's 2011 wedding).

 Madame Tussauds London is a museum and tourist attraction housed in the former London Planetarium. It is known for recreating life-size wax models of celebrities, and also houses its famous Chamber of Horrors.



Visitors looking for a mix of futuristic flair, up and coming development and historical charm might enjoy spending some time in Abu Dhabi, capital of the United Arab Emirates. Abu Dhabi is the largest and wealthiest of the UAE's seven emirates and has most of the country's oil reserves. While it's not nearly as cosmopolitan as Dubai, the emirate can be more liveable. Since the weather heats up in the summer, the best time to visit is October until April.

WHAT TO DO

- Visit Yas Island and take photos of the flash boats at the Yas Marina, as well as exploring Yas Hotel, a futuristic building next to the Formula 1 track for Abu Dhabi's Grand Prix. Try the sweet and sour chicken at Noodle Box, a contemporary Asian restaurant that boasts an outside terrace facing the track.
- Attend a live concert at the Yas Arena, which has hosted past performances by Thirty Seconds to Mars and Eric Clapton. Later in the evening go to the Skylite lounge back at Yas Island Hotel and knock back a mojito on the rooftop. Dress is smart casual.
- Soak up some morning sun by visiting Al Raha Beach, a popular public beach close to the city centre. For the ladies-only beach, head to West Corniche Road leading to the Abu Dhabi Ladies Club.
- For lunch try UAE's nationwide chain Automatic Restaurant in the Al Markaziyah area. This Lebanese restaurant offers some of the best shwarmas, shish tawouk (a traditional Arabic shish kebab) and hummus in town.
- Go to the famous Emirates Palace where world leaders meet. Have afternoon tea in the main lobby. Not only does the menu offer some of the most delicate sandwiches, but the signature cappuccino is topped with gold flakes.




- · Khalifa Park, a half a million square metre area with a museum, a 3200-seat amphitheatre, sports area, water features, a monorail, and fountains, sculptures, theme parks and restaurants. Take a ride on the ferris wheel, appreciate the sculptures and take a ride on the train at Falcon Station.
- Sheikh Zayed Grand Mosque can accommodate up to 40 000 worshippers. Women will be given an abaya to cover up with. Take a photo of one of the largest chandeliers in the world.

- Make sure you have checked the calendar of religious holidays before your travel. Many government agencies may be closed during holidays, and restaurants and cafes suspend the sale of alcoholic beverages.
- While visiting markets, restaurants and other public places, take any items only with your right hand this is local etiquette. Likewise when giving money to sellers, waiters and taxi drivers.



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You can go for the natural beauty, brilliant sunshine and endless beaches - but there are even more reasons to visit Mauritius, includina golf, diving and snorkelling.



Mauritius, North Coast



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auritius is a tropical fantasy of an island in the southern Indian Ocean, blessed with sunshine, trade winds and endless beaches. But there is a lot more to Mauritius than just swaying palm trees and soaking up the rays. Mauritius (French: Maurice, Mauritian Creole: Moris) is an island nation in the Indian Ocean situated some 2000 km from the African continent. The country consists of the islands of Mauritius, Rodrigues, Agalega and Cargados Carajos.

Mauritius is mostly appreciated by tourists for its natural beauty and man-made attractions, multi-ethnic and cultural diversity, tropical climate, beautiful beaches and water sports.

Fusion of cultures: Uninhabited in 1507, Mauritius has assimilated visitors from Madagascar, the East Indies, Netherlands, France, England, Indonesia and the Far East. Today it is a model of diversity and tolerance.

Natural history: The dodo has become synonymous with extinction, but few people realise that this large, flightless bird lived only on Mauritius. You can see its reconstructed skeleton at the Natural History Museum in Port Louis.

Golf by design: Golf legend Ernie Els designed the region's top course, Four Seasons Golf Club at Mauritius. Winding past lagoons, sugarcane fields, and along beautiful

coastline, it showcases the natural splendour of Mauritius. **Nature on display:** Mauritius has nearly a dozen important nature reserves and botanical gardens to explore, in settings from the city centre to the Black River Gorge, and others set amidst tropical mountains and waterfalls. The Pamplemousses Botanical Garden, the oldest botanical garden in the Southern Hemisphere, is famous for its 85 varieties of palm trees, giant water lilies and other plant species.

Dance demonstrations: The Se´ga, a traditional Creole dance, is held regularly around the island. Part opera, part orchestrated group dance, the women of the co-ed Se´ga wear colourful ruffled skirts, and the performance builds in tempo and even involves the audience.

World-class fishing: One of the top offshore sport fishing destinations on earth, the waters of Mauritius have yielded world records for several varieties of shark and tuna. In fact, Mauritius hosts the annual Marlin World Cup, where marlin catches of over half a ton are not uncommon.

Sugar mill and restaurant: Visit the Beau Plan sugar mill to learn about the role of sugar in the island's history and then dine at the Fangourin restaurant set in the garden.

The menu features seafood with dishes such as escalope of sea bream with crayfish butter and sweet potato purée,

and delicious desserts like Muscovado 'crème brulee' with lavender.

A green landscape: The Mauritian Wildlife Foundation has turned back time on the island of Ile aux Aigrettes. Cleared of non-native plants and animals, it was returned to its original wild state, where the kestrel and pink pigeon flourish along with giant tortoises.

Diving discoveries: Diving and snorkelling are fabulous

on Mauritius, with many of the reefs and surrounding areas now protected by the Mauritius Marine Conservation Society. The result is a treasure trove of coral reefs, shipwrecks and marine life of all shapes and sizes. The flavour of rum: Once almost entirely devoted to sugarcane production, Mauritius still boasts a booming rum culture. The most famous label, Green Island, is the sole export, but many high-quality and aged rums made locally can be sampled at bars. Saint Aubin Plantation located along the undulating slopes of southern Mauritius has been under sugarcane cultivation since 1819. The estate takes its name from one of its first owners, Pierre de Saint Aubin. Pampering: Spas are to Mauritius what gambling is to Monte Carlo. Most luxury hotels have spas, but Shanti Maurice (shantimaurice.com), near Felix on the south coast, is among the best. There's a wide range of Ayurvedic and international treatments on offer, as well as stress management and weight-loss courses. Take the plunge with panchakarma (total body cleansing). For something a bit more fun, Constance Le Prince Maurice on Belle Mare Peninsula (princemaurice.com) is a private estate on an isolated peninsula with a lovely infinity pool, while the OTT Givenchy Spa at Le Touessrok (letouessrokresort.com) has been lauded for its No Surgetics Facial. Sanctuary Spa at The Residence Mauritius (theresidence.com) has just had an impressive facelift. Stay: The impossibly glamorous resorts of Mauritius are what attracted holidaymakers in the first place. Shaggy thatched roofs, mimosa trees and private pools are the order of the day in a series of palm-fringed fantasy hideaways, while there are plenty of sleek retreats marrying modern architecture to the tropical landscape too. The Four Seasons at Anahita (fourseasons.com) has taken a modernist, designer-concept approach, while The Sofitel So Mauritius (sofitel.com) at BelOmbre has allowed Japanese designer Kenzo Takada free reign, resulting in hibiscus-motif pillows and lime-green leather beds. Also worth noting is Le Méridien lle Maurice, particularly for its beautifully landscaped gardens (lemeridien-mauritius. com). LUX* Island Resorts (formerly the Naïade group, luxislandresorts.com), has three newly spruced-up properties, Beau Rivage, Les Pavillions and Legends, with retro ice-cream parlours and film screenings on the beach.



Just opened is the 50-suite boutique Angsana Balaclava by Banyan Tree (angsana.com), while St Regis is set to be one of the top addresses on the island (stregis-mauritius.com).

Shop till you drop: Central Market in Farquhar Street, Port Louis, is the true Mauritian shopping experience. Hot, bustling and colourful, it overflows with fresh fruit and vegetables, Indian spices and dried fish. Haggling is essential at the souvenir stalls where you can buy wood and brass dodos, Balinese masks, Indian prints, bags of every shape and size, pashminas and the usual 'designer' labels. Outside the market you'll be greeted by travelling salesmen with mangos and pineapples strapped to their motorcycles. Or try the market at Curepipe, the Bazaar at Grand Baie or the boutiques along Le Caudon Waterfront.

DAY 01 - SAT - KUALA LUMPUR - CAMERON HIGHLANDS (220 KM)

Depart by 0830 hours for Cameron Highland located at 1542 metres above sea level and noted for its tea plantations and cool temperatures. Stop on the way for a visit to see the cottage industry of basket weaving followed by Lata Iskandar Waterfall and a native settlement. Be immersed in the cool, crisp air of Cameron Highlands with its wonderful scenery. Tour of Cameron Highlands consists of the tea plantation, tea factory, market place and butterfly farm. Overnight.

Note: Tea factory operation is closed on Monday and public holidays.

DAY 02 - SUN - CAMERON HIGHLANDS - PENANG (330 KM)

Early morning set off to Penang. En route visit the Sam Poh Tong cave temple. Thereafter stop at the Royal town of Kuala Kangsar for a spell of photographing of the exterior view only of Ubudiah Mosque, Iskandariah Palace and Istana Kenangan. Proceed further to Kuala Sepetang mangrove forest, the best-managed mangrove forest in Malaysia and one that serves a very important ecological role in protecting the coastline from erosion. Delight in the novelty of walking through natural mangrove forest on a boardwalk. Kuala Sepetang produces the bulk of the nation's top quality mangrove charcoal. Visit a charcoal kiln where charcoals are produced. Cross over to Penang, better known as the "Pearl of the Orient" via one of the longest bridges in the world. Overnight.

DAY 03 - MON - DISCOVERY TOUR OF GEORGETOWN, PENANG

0900 hrs, depart from hotel for a City, Culture, and Heritage tour of Georgetown, which was officially declared as a UNESCO SITE in 2008. Visit the 3rd longest reclining Buddha figure in the world followed by Kek Lok Si Temple, also known as Temple of 1000 Buddhas that was built in 1904. It is the most beautiful and largest Buddhist temple complex in South East Asia. Next we visit Fort Cornwallis, the landing site of Captain Francis Light in 1786 when he arrived to start the first British colony in Penang. The tour carries on with a visit to the water village of The Clan Jetties at Weld Quay, so named as residents of each jetty share similar surnames. We next take you along Pitt Street, also known as "The Street of Harmony". Here churches, Chinese temples, mosques and Hindu temples are built along the same street in harmonious existence side by side for centuries. Visit the intricate Khoo Kong Si clan's house. Enjoy a breezy trishaw ride, a still popular mode of transport in Georgetown. Return to the hotel and the rest of the day is at your own leisure. In the late evening, you can explore the nightlife along Batu Ferringhi, Penang style! Overnight.

DAY 04 - TUE - PENANG - KOTA BHARU (400 KM)

Depart at 0830 hours, travelling west to east overland across Peninsular Malaysia through the main mountain range, which offers breathtaking views of the dense tropical rain forest whilst journeying through villages and plantations. En route, we will make a photo stop on Banding Island with its scenic view of the famous Temenggor lake, which is good spot for a lunch break (not inclusive in tour price) or enjoying the scenery of the calm, picturesque lake surrounded by the grand and immense tropical rainforest in the background. Further on, we will stop at the highest mountain point on this route, 1050 meters above sea level overlooking Thailand and Malaysian border, offering a breathtaking view of the famous Titiwangsa mountain range with its dense tropical rainforest. On arrival in the state of Kelantan, we will proceed to the border town of Rantau Panjang, a meeting, mingling and trading point for people of Thailand and Malaysia. From the Malaysian side of the border one can see Thai villages across the Golok River, which is the lifeline for the people on both sides, especially as a source of water supply for their daily and agricultural use. "Duty free" shops offer varieties of products to visitors. Overnight.








DAY 05 - WED - KOTA BHARU - TERENGGANU (170 KM)

At 0830 hours, we start the day with a visit to the famous and colourful wet market of Kota Bharu and the traditional cottage industries such as silver handicraft and songket weaving. Drive along the scenic coastline southward towards Kuala Terengganu, tasting some keropok, the very popular local chips made of fish or prawn. Check in at the beach hotel. Free and easy day at own leisure. Overnight.



DAY 06 - THUR - TERENGGANU - KUANTAN (250 KM)

Check out of hotel after early breakfast at 0800 hours, heading towards Kuantan. Stop in Kuala Terengganu to visit Pulau Duyong, famous for its traditional way of boat making in the region. A must is the visit to the Islamic Civilization Park at the Waterfront Heritage City of Kuala Terengganu showcasing twenty replicas of great Islamic monuments of the world such as Alhambra Citadel of Spain, Taj Mahal of Agra India, Masjidil Haram of Mecca, Saudi Arabia, Dome of the Rock, Palestine and many more. Last but not least is the visit to the Grand Crystal Mosque, the icon and the highlight of the park. We continue our visit to a brassware-making center. As we head further south towards Cherating in the district of Kuantan, we will stop at a scenic coastal fishing village and visit a turtle information centre where you can learn more about this endangered species of the sea. On route, taste the "lemang", rice cooked with coconut milk in bamboo, a popular Malay delicacy not to be missed. This is followed by afternoon tea hosted by the local community, after which the tour takes you to Cherating. Cherating's main attractions include a trained monkey plucking coconuts and the cottage industry of mengkuang leaves being woven into bags and mats amongst other things. Overnight.

DAY 07 FRI - KUANTAN - KUALA LUMPUR (270 KM)

electing a tour to fulfil one's requirements is almost the same as choosing a travel buddy. Finding someone that shares one's world and travel outlook is the crucial difference between an amazing trip and one that you almost regret. The same is true of tour companies. It is always best to do the research on any business before agreeing to pay in advance for a tour that may not be to one's liking. There are several ways that one can determine if taking a trip with an organisation will suit your travel objectives.

Is the tour company reputable?

A quick online search will provide vacation planners with an extensive array of travel package options, yet reviews of websites for such companies are few and far between. Before booking any trip, first visit Trip Advisor and Hello Peter to see if you are spending your hard-earned money with the correct service provider. Recommendations from family and friends are other options for finding a reputable tour company or hiring a travel agent.

Does the tour feature the correct destinations?

One should always make sure that the tour is not only in the right country, but also takes in all the sites and locations you want to see. Travellers may not always keep in mind that destinations are further apart than they appear on the map! After spending all day in a bus, no one is going to want to rent a car and drive another two hours to see another out-of-the-way attraction. Therefore, if there is a place you deem a must-see location, make sure that your chosen tour includes it.

tossed in with a group of budget-

conscious voyagers.

Active people on leisure tours and relaxed people on action-packed journeys might be equally irritated. For others, having a tour that is environmentally friendly or that is completely flexible is a chief priority. Be sure that excursions you choose are compatible with what you want! Keep in mind that most tours have a target demographic, and while those that don't belong to it are often still welcome to participate, they might

not have as good a time as they otherwise would have. Be sure you can handle being around a tour's target demographic.

What about the size of the group?

Gregarious people or those that don't mind being lost in the crowd might be perfectly fine travelling en masse, while introverts and those that want a balance of personalised attention and anonymity might be happier in a much smaller group. This is a matter of personal choice, but should be carefully considered before booking.

If all of these elements are considered, it is quite likely that you will have a wonderful vacation. The only thing that remains is booking plane tickets. Just don't forget to pack the sunscreen and the camera!



WILDLIFE RESERVE

Star of the Little Karoo

Set on 54 000 hectares of land, Sanbona Wildlife Reserve is paradise for animal lovers, plant experts, bird afficionadas and star-gazers.

ur journey takes us to the foothills of the Warmwaterberg, where the harsh and unforgiving landscape is offset by panoramic vistas as far as the eye can see. During our sojourn we will be staying at Gondwana Lodge, one of three accommodation options at Sanbona. You can choose to stay at Tilney Manor, a historical property steeped in olden times, or Dwyka Tented Lodge, a haven of secluded luxury. There is also the seasonal Sanbona Explorer, ideal for guests looking for an authentic bush tent camp experience.

On our first game drive we are taken around by our very conversant ranger, whose sole responsibility is to take care of us and another couple. He has a penchant for cheetahs, and as luck would have it our first sighting is of a cheetah mom and her four cubs.

Sanbona isn't only renowned for its animal sightings, but also for the 600 different types of plant species. He points us towards the prevalent acacia thicket, feeding source of the giraffe and elephants. The cutest succulents are undoubtedly the Baby Bottoms. After a nice drive we stop among zebras to enjoy refreshments. Heading back to camp, we spot a rhino languidly grazing and a journey of giraffe.

Before dinner we are taken star-gazing, and see Mars, Jupiter, Orion, The Southern Cross and Cancer, to name a few. All the meals at Gondwana are a culinary delight. The menu changes on a daily basis. For dinner my husband and I both opt for the braised Springbok shanks, served with creamed potato and a *melange* of roasted vegetables, enhanced by a rosemary and red wine *jus*.

The next morning's game drive has our ranger's affinity for cheetahs paying off as he spots two brothers at the top of

the hill. They slowly make they way towards us, walk right past the vehicle and do what big cats do – mark their territory on the first tree they can find.

Our ranger is intent on finding the lions today. We head to a different part of the reserve where these elusive cats were spotted a couple of days earlier. The kudus at the top of the hill look very skittish, and he is confident that the lions must be lurking somewhere in the vicinity. He puts the tracker on and it starts beeping, indicating that the lions must be in close proximity. "Keep your eyes peeled", he instructs. I can feel my heart beating with every beep, and they seem to be getting louder. Nothing. My heart sinks. Just as we are about to leave, he sees something moving in the thicket. The outline is that of a white lion. I look up and there he stands in the middle of the dry riverbed – a male white lion looking straight at us.

Heading back, we are awestruck by the vision of a herd of elephants. On our way to a sunset cruise on Bellair Dam a few grazing buffalo make their appearance. On our last day our ranger and Roman Ndeja show us around a cave with San paintings, always fascinating. I look up from our vantage point and imagine catching a glimpse of a leopard, but it was just a very spotty rock.

Sanbona, part of the Shamwari Group, is a magical place. Don't take my word for it. Come and experience for yourself. ■
